Humility as the Foundation of Forgiveness

Rector's page One of my dearest mentors is Brother Wayne Teasdale, OSB Cam. He is a monk in the Order of St. Benedict of Nursia, which is also influenced by the early 11th Century reformation of monastic life at Camaldoli, Italy. So, he is a Camaldolese Benedictine monk. On May 17, 2005, I entered this order of monastics/monks by making Oblation of my whole life and to live according to the Rule of St. Benedict and the Little Rule of St. Romuald, which meant that I was to take up a spiritual discipline that was perhaps, one step beyond my vocation as a baptized Christian. Moreover, I think it was God's call within a call that drew me into the monastic order of Camaldolese Benedictines. In order to become an Oblate, I had to go through 18 months of prayer and study with a final deliberation in the presence of the Oblate Director, Brother Bede Healey, OSB Cam. My process to become an oblate started in January of 2004. As a part of that process I had planned to visit several monks who were living in the world. Cyprian Consiglio in Santa Cruz, CA and Wayne Teasdale in Chicago, IL were my top priorities. I met Cyprian, but two weeks prior to my planned visit to Chicago to see Wayne, he died suddenly of cancer. Only some 15 days after diagnosis, Wayne had gone beyond his physical body through death.

Wayne is my brother monk who is still my mentor, whom I never was able to meet in person. Here is a Vital Practice for us to share ministry in while we begin to live into our theme; "Our Village within Vital Practice merits a View for Vibrancy."

"Humility begins with self-honesty about our actions,

attitudes, and speech.

It compels us to accept the fact that

we are capable of being wrong,

perhaps even when we are convinced we are right.

It means that we acknowledge our mistakes,

not years from now,

but when they are made.

We must be willing to own up to these mistakes

before others and not simply ourselves.

Such humility is a basic operating principle of ordinary life.

Church Shorthand:

The Presentation of Our Lord Jesus Christ in the Temple is February 2nd. It celebrates our Lord's presentation to God on the fortieth day after his birth, in obedience to the Jewish Law. It remind of the Jewish law (Exodus 13:2, 22-29) that every firstborn son was to be dedicated to God in memory of the Israelites' deliverance from Egypt, when the firstborn sons of the Egyptians died and those of Israel were spared. On this fortieth day, the Light of Christ enters the temple.

This is a moment of manifestation of Jesus as the Messiah when Old and New Testament come together in the testimony of the aged priest Simeon and the prophetess Anna. The old sacrifices, the burnt offerings and oblations, were done away; a new and perfect offering had come into the temple. The liturgical color for this day is white.
